Topic of the Month New tool for detecting chronic pneumonia

Pneumonia is a major cause of death and chronic disease in calves. Some of these calves, if they survive, may have damage to their lungs that is not apparent by looking at them. Dr. Pickett recently attended a workshop on ultrasound evaluation of lungs in calves. Lung ultrasound has several values in calf raising including calf selection and culling, evaluation of treatment protocol, and evaluation of vaccination protocol at both the individual and herd level. By ultrasounding the lungs, we can determine which calves will become chronic lungers. At the same time, her navel can be scanned for infection and her liver can be scanned for abscesses. This can have an impact on her prognosis.

Dairy Cow Slaughter Up Over December

Dairy farmers, perhaps waiting to take advantage of a new tax year, sent 10,000 more cows to slaughter in January this year than in December 2015, the United States Department of Agriculture reported this afternoon.

What's more amazing is that January 2016 had one less business day than December 2015, so on a daily basis, cow culling was actually up 9%.

On a year-over-year basis, dairy farmers culled 9,900 cows fewer in January 2016 than they did in January 2015. That's a 3.6% decrease.

The raw culling numbers: January 2016—265,500; December 2015—255,400; January 2015—275,400.
