Topic of the Month Veterinary Feed Directive

Many farmers are fretting about the impending regulations concerning antibiotics in the feed that will be effective on January 1, 2017. Here are a few things to consider.

These regulations require veterinary feed directive (VFD) for any "medically important" antibiotics that will be incorporated into livestock feed. An example of this would be Aureomycin for treatment or prevention of pneumonia in calves. A VFD order is available only from a veterinarian and is good for 6 months from the date it is written. Non-medically important antibiotics like monensin (Rumensin) are not covered by these requirements. These can be purchased as usual.

Medically important antibiotics made to be incorporated in animal's drinking water, like tetracycline, will be made prescription and no longer over the counter.

These regulations will only affect farms that feed antibiotics to livestock. It will not affect over the counter injectable antibiotics like Penicillin or oxytetracycline. But if the need arises for you to utilize antibiotics in the feed, we can see that your animals are treated appropriately
